The Hamilton Anti-Racism Resource Centre (HARRC) is a community-based organization dedicated to confronting racism and promoting equity across Hamilton. We work to address systemic discrimination, provide direct support to individuals impacted by racism, and build community partnerships to create meaningful change. Through workshops, advocacy, anti-racism education, and public forums, we aim to empower individuals, create understanding, and advocate for anti-racist policies that build an inclusive Hamilton.

WHAT WE DO

Mission: To foster a Hamilton free from racism, discrimination, and oppression by providing resources, education and support to individuals and communities to actively confront racism

Vision: A Hamilton where people are valued, respected, and treated equitably regardless of their race. We strive for a community where diversity is respected, systemic barriers are dismantled, and anti-racist ideas are supported.

HARRC Community Health Equity Meeting Collaborating for Inclusive Change with the Hamilton Board of Health

The Hamilton Anti-Racism Resource Centre, in partnership with the Hamilton Centre for Civic Inclusion (HCCI) the City of Hamilton, and McMaster University Office of Community Engagement, hosted a Community Health Equity Meeting to discuss the re-structure of the Hamilton Board of Health. This meeting presented a valuable opportunity for community members to provide feedback, share experiences, and contribute ideas on how the Board of Health could better reflect and address the diverse needs of Hamilton's communities.



"The Hamilton Anti-Racism Resource Centre and the Hamilton Centre for Civic Inclusion (HCCI) put forward our joint submission to the City of Hamilton's public consultation on reviewing Hamilton Public Health's governance model. Our organizations continue to lead the work to promote equity, anti-racism, diversity, anti-oppression, and inclusion in Hamilton. **-Access to health or lack thereof is political.** We believe that people who are socially marginalized and discriminated against are also at risk of being politically marginalized, with their unique needs not being considered by policymakers. We believe that by supporting marginalized populations, we can improve the overall health and well-being of our entire community in Hamilton."

ANTI-RACISM POLICY


In collaboration with the Citf Hamilton's Committee Against Racism, HARRC initiated efforts to reform the citizen selection process for the Police Services Board. This initiative aimed to create a more inclusive and transparent selection process that reflects the diverse voices of our community. Responding to ongoing community concerns, particularly around police use of force data, this reform seeks to ensure meaningful representation and accountability within the Police Services Board, reinforcing our commitment to equity and accountability in Hamilton.

OUR WORKSHOPS

HARRC offers impactful anti-racism workshops, focusing on raising awareness about racism and understanding the effects of microaggressions. In partnership with Youthrive and City School by Mohawk College, these workshops provide participants with practical knowledge and tools to recognize, address, and prevent microaggressions, fostering more inclusive and respectful environments. Through this collaboration, we aim to empower individuals and organizations to actively promote equity and contribute to a more welcoming community. When youth are empowered, engaged, and included, youth will thrive!

HARRC's anti-racism workshops are designed to empower youth, adults, and families to deepen their understanding of racism and to equip them with tools to respond effectively and advocate for meaningful change. Through these interactive sessions, participants gain insights into the lived reality of racism and practical strategies to challenge discrimination, build resilience. Our goal is to create a foundation for individuals and families to become informed advocates, strengthening the collective effort to stand against racism.

For National Indigenous Peoples Day, the Hamilton Anti-Racism Resource Centre, in collaboration with the Indigenous Relations Team, co-hosted a community panel discussion featuring Indigenous voices. This event provided a meaningful platform for Indigenous community members to share their experiences, perspectives, and insights on issues impacting Indigenous communities. The discussion aimed to create understanding, respect, and allyship, highlighting the importance of Indigenous leadership and resilience in the journey toward equity and reconciliation.



On March 21st, in recognition of the International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination, the Hamilton Anti-Racism Resource Centre hosted a powerful community event featuring renowned author and anti-racist scholar, Dr. Ibram X. Kendi. Dr. Kendi shared insights from his groundbreaking work on understanding and dismantling systemic racism, sparking thought-provoking discussions with attendees. The event included a panel discussion and provided an opportunity for community members to deepen their understanding of anti-racism and to explore actionable steps toward building a more equitable and inclusive Hamilton.





On October 5, 2024, the Hamilton Anti-Racism Resource Centre celebrated community and creativity at the Fall Into Community event, hosted in partnership with Arts for All at Corktown Park. This family-friendly event featured anti-racism engaging arts and crafts activities for children, allowing young participants to express themselves artistically, while co-ed soccer games brought people of all ages together for some friendly, active fun. The day highlighted the joy of community connection and collaboration in a lively, welcoming setting.


Initial summary report


For years, the people of Hamilton have been working to respond to the needs of those who experience hate. This platform is a result of collective work and advocacy. WeSupport, the idea that the experience of hate is a site for care. In 2019, we studied the practice of doing something differently in respect to how we respond to those who experience hate. We reviewed existing literature, existing platforms and reporting systems that arose in response to the inadequacies of police based or complaint based legal juridical. What we found was that the needs of those who experience hate were indeed sites for care. This corresponded with the needs expressed by those who attended a forum about the pilot project year for the Hamilton Anti-Racism Resource Centre, where participants expressed the need for online pathways and resources to be developed in addition to in-person support or individual-based responses to needs.

WeSupport is about recognizing that the experience of hate can come with the experience of pain and suffering. These experiences should not be left in isolation. WeSupport is a way to respond with care as the entry point. This platform offers a way to tell your story and be heard, to connect with existing resources and support, to not be alone when you navigate difficult systems of complaint, whether it be in areas of healthcare, employment, education, housing, community safety, public policy, juridical and others.

WeSupport also cares about your story and that it belongs to you. This respect has gone into how we thought about your privacy and confidentiality. Nothing you share will be shared without your consent. WeSupport is also a movement that brings together and mobilizes solidarities that have been building for many years to address issues that we know to be historical, social, political and thereby systemic across allied agencies and organizations that value the knowledge that comes from community and lived experiences. To date, there have been 40 total submissions on the online platform From March 2023-October 2024, 2 of which were hate directed at the reporting system. People reporting hate incidents often reporting multiple, intersecting forms of hate being directed at them simultaneously.

People reporting described Ableist slurs, Anti-Black racism, Transphobic hate, Homophobia, vandalism, attacks, Anti-Asian racism, reporting hate stickers in public spaces, threats, and intimidation.






HARRC Staff documented the incidents, provided follow up and monitoring, made referrals to City staff, conducted a home visit, issued a public letter, met with family, Schools Board, Equity Office, Referred to Victim's Services or intervened by removal hate objects.


Experiencing and reporting hate is difficult. The platform is becoming known to the community and an initial public campaign in forthcoming to increase awareness of the platform. WeSupportHamilton is providing an additional avenue for community members to report incidents of hate and receive support when requested.

Web-Form Inquiries Summary Report

Between October 2023 and October 2024, 40 report were made to HARRC through the web-form on the HARRC website.

The types of hate reported included anti-immigrant hate, antisemitism, anti-LGBT hate, anti-Black racism, report of a White supremacist event, Islamophobia, anti-Asian hate, Blackface, Anti-Indigenous racism, racist flags reported, Fat shaming, and Afro-Latinex racism.





Hate incident reported took place at businesses, libraries, at private residences, university, online, on public streets and parks, at the Hamilton convention centre and outside residences.

HARRC responses included follow up of support by phone and email, reporting to the libraries, connecting people to legal supports, documenting, connecting to health supports, victim services, and reporting to the City.

Hate continues to be pervasive, and widespread in Hamilton. Online methods of reporting continue to provide pathways to support for those experiencing hate.
